It is a short school week this week as the Bank Holiday was moved to tomorrow to celebrate Victory in Europe (VE) day. This year marks 75 years since the guns fell silent at the end of the war in Europe. The BBC will be broadcasting the recorded speech by Prime Minister Churchill at 3pm on Friday and families are being encouraged to stand during this and undertake the Nation's Toast to toast the heroes of WWII, using the words, "To those who gave so much, we thank you." know that lots of families have been preparing for lockdown picnics and children have been making flags and designing VE day teacups etc. as part of their Home Learning this week. We hope you have a good day and hope you can enjoy some of the sunshine whilst remembering the sacrifice made by so many during war time.

School reopening

I just wanted to pre-empt possible queries and questions about schools re-opening as there is a great deal of speculation about what the Government may announce in the next few days. Firstly, I would like to reassure parents that we are working very closely with the Local Authority who in turn works very closely with the Department for Education. There is a great deal of planning relating to re-opening and a great many questions and concerns which we are working through together. Please be assured that our priority will be on well-being and safety and as a result it is likely that the school will look and feel a little different for a while. Please also be assured that when we are able, we will share our reopening plans with you. However, the key message is one of reassurance and we thank you once again for your support and patience at this time.

Video calls with teachers

As a staff, we have had opportunities to meet 'virtually' and we would love to give your children the same opportunity. We miss seeing them and I'm sure they miss their teachers and class mates too!! Therefore, next week we will be emailing all families with a link and password to a 'Zoom' meeting. This will be a year group or small group at a time (not whole class - depending on numbers) as we would like to give all children a chance to talk. A few minutes before the allocated time of the meeting, click on the link and if you already have Zoom as an APP it will take you to the 'meeting' automatically. If you don't have the APP, it will prompt you to download it. If you don't want to download the APP, it will ask if you wish to open it in your browser and it will take you to a web version.

For safeguarding reasons, we have some guidelines that we expect all families to follow:

- It must just be the child who is on the screen for others to see and no one else.
- Your child must be supervised by you, in the same room, for the duration of the zoom meeting.
- Your child must be dressed appropriately imagine you are coming to school on a non-uniform day.
- Please do not screen shot the meeting in any way these would be images in people's homes and would not be appropriate to share with others.
- Please discuss expectations about conduct with your child they should conduct themselves in the same way that they do in school. They will each be given a turn to share something that they have been doing and must listen to others when it is isn't their turn.

Of course, if you would prefer not to take part or you are unable to join the meeting for some reason, please do not worry. If this is successful, and we do not have too many technical hitches, we will try to give other opportunities to do this!

Monet class



Support for all


