
# 200 Million Minutes - We have started counting!

The challenge will run until Tuesday 2nd April 2019. We will log all the minutes of reading in school and are asking for your support to log the minutes read at home. These can be added into your child's reading log – please write MM followed by the number of minutes. We will then collate these and enter them onto our school area of the AfA website. There will be a prize for the child in each class who reads the most minutes and our school can win a fantastic prize if our average number of minutes per child is the highest overall!! PLEASE, PLEASE do encourage lots of reading!!! If your child is in Van Gogh or Monet, you may include the number of minutes spent listening to an adult reading too.

**Jobs List** 

#### All things wooden!!

- 1. Recoat all the sheds with green stain
- 2. Fix any holes in sheds with shiplap
- 3. Rowing boat sanding and re-varnish in Foundation area
- 4. Take down pallet playhouse on field
- 5. Fix the 'stage' area
- 6. Paint clock tower blue
- 7. Re-stain the well in the 'eco garden'
- 8. Stain the bench in the maze
- 9. Corner planters by the maze needs attention!!
- 10. Flat stepping stones in Foundation need the numbers repainting
- 11. Gate need to be fixed longer latch in Foundation area
- 12. Rebuild gas cupboard doors and roofing
- 13. Perspex for gardening shed by bin storage area
- 14. Musical instruments to be made up for outside, use area behind climbing wall
- 15. Re-bark the maze, surplus to go to the secret garden area
- 16. Removal of rotten benches
- 17. British Values signs to be put up on PE shed and STARS shed
- 18. Sand and stain wooden slats in the Foundation dome
- 19. Put up bird boxes/ladybird boxes

# Do you know about MOMO?

A recent social media challenge targeting children and young adults called the "Momo Challenge," has created concern throughout the country and in many schools. The "Momo Challenge" is being spliced into YouTube videos; you may have seen in the press that videos including content from Peppa Pig and Fortnite are being targeted when they are viewed through YouTube (not through official sites for these games). The "Momo Challenge," a 'game' found on Facebook and the app, WhatsApp, features a frightening avatar who asks its viewers to perform dangerous tasks and provide photos as proof. The "Momo" threatens those who do not perform the tasks. Thankfully, we have not been

informed about any of our children coming across this but if they do mention it or are frightened by it, we have put some useful links below to support you in supporting your child.
