
### **Department for Education**



### **Prayer**


God of love and hope,

- Dog shampoo


#### Skills

Raising a pet is a big commitment. It takes time but also money to look after it well. There are some things you would need to spend money on:

- Bedding / Housing
- Toys / equipment for play and exercise
- Food
- Grooming
- Vet's fees - injections, medication, injuries
- Feeding equipment
- Pet insurance
- Lead / collar for walking
- Microchipping
